Message from the President: Annual meeting is Sunday

Sunday's Annual Meeting is the official start to a week of fun and activities for Lake Hayward Days. We have important business to tend to first, but I promise an organized and well-run meeting to navigate through the budget, board nominations and pilot project discussion.

I will do my part if you do yours and take advantage of the information made available to help you prepare for the meeting. To start the meeting promptly at 10 a.m., come early for refreshments and to avoid long registration lines. Parking Passes and Boat Stickers will be available AFTER the meeting to avoid additional delays. Lake Hayward Days Committee Report will be the only committee presenting so please look for your favorite committee update in this newsletter.

Gary Petersen, our properties chair, has outlined his operations as well as capital maintenance plans in his report and the basis of his budget requests for both the 2014-15 and 2015-16 operating budgets as well as capital maintenance reserves. For the second half of this season, we are still talking about goose poop control – our beach rakers are tasked with helping in this area during morning clean up, but we are working on finding ways to keep up with them and keep them off the land. It seems

as if the daily cleanup isn't sufficient.

The board has been asked to reconsider our policy of no dogs on the beach during select hours as extensive research has shown that this is a deterrent that works.

We are taking this matter up again at this morning's board meeting.

I can hear the screams of dissent, but remember, we do not have a dog problem, we have a geese problem and there isn't any one answer to solving this.

We are also looking at other suggestions such as CD lines, standing objects on the beaches and light solutions for the overnight to keep the geese off the beaches. It has been an horrendous year for this problem – and an ongoing battle. Thank you to everyone who has helped with the clean up and ideas, as well as the emails voicing your concerns. The research, trials, and cleanup continues.

Thank you to Debbie Smith for chairing our Nominations Commit-

tee. Debbie will present the board slate at the meeting tomorrow. We will have some vacant openings going into next year, but we are talking to people who have expressed interest in learning more about the role and what contribution they can make. See the Board nominations and slate of officers you will be voting on in this newsletter.

In case you missed it last week, we are repeating the financials and commentary in preparation for tomorrow's meeting. We caught a few errors (not of omission, but typos) and I ask that you bring this information to the meeting as we might not have extra copies available to hand out. The budget is posted at each of the beaches.

Again, in case you missed it...My comments from last week reprinted:

While we may still have some challenges, we have seen great strides in our tax collection strategies and timely receipts, and derived additional income through interest assessed, liens placed and settled through real estate transactions. Through the efforts of the Lake Quality Improvement Committee and residents on the east side of the lake, we have raised more than \$2,000 to date in contributions toward our Lake Quality Programs and will make this an

A recent audit of association parking lots over two weekends revealed 100 percent compliance (kinda sorta) at various times and especially during the wonderful swim races on Sunday, (thank you Linda, Diane and Coach).

The kinda sorta though is that we were willing to accept passes from the past few years, even saw one from 2001 on a passenger car at Second Beach - wow!

note that our parking policy is a year round policy and not just seasonal.

The 2015 Season Permits will be Hang Tags and will be the only recognized permit valid during our continued patrols next year. The permits will be in your Spring Packet. The packets will be mailed out by April 1 to accommodate seasonal residents who receive mail at their winter address. These tags are expensive and we will enforce the \$25.00 per tag replacement cost if you forget or lose the passes you were assigned.

Window stickers and guest passes from other decades will not be honored in 2015. Please be sure that we have your proper mailing address and if you are not

sure we have the most up to date mailing address, email it to us at lakehaywardct@gmail.com or send it to POALH, PO Box 230, Colchester, CT 06415. In 2015, we plan to issue four hang tags to each household for use on any family or guest vehicle. We strongly suggest you leave the tags at the cottage and not in the vehicle - you only get four per household. They hang from the mirror and will be hard to miss when you leave after the weekend. Special passes will be available for special events (like swim lessons, chef camp, etc.) and vendors who are providing services to the association.

annual fundraiser, along with our continued efforts to get matching funds from the town during the budget period. We are in a strong cash position, committed to a conservative taxing policy with improved planning for capital reserves. Part of that planning is certainly related to our association properties, but we have to also address our overall lake quality and do what we can to protect our property values and enjoyment of the lake.

The Lake Quality Improvement Committee has been tasked to consider a number of items in its scope of responsibilities. We can see that their role in the expanded weed treatment has resulted in a successful eradication of the invasive weeds in the targeted areas. During the off season, the group also reviewed and studied suction dredging solutions and considered 4 vendors to recommend one for both our proposed

pilot project at second beach boat launch (read more about this below) and one to work with private waterfront owners to clear muck and debris (at homeowners expense). Suction dredging could be a potential long term muck solution to all Beaches, so this pilot will help us plan for the future.

While in the past, we have "saved for future lake weed treatment", we have learned that it is important to look at a number of solutions that address a variety of lake quality concerns – concerns that impact each and everyone of us and requires us to protect our investment and manage the overall quality of our lake.

So, in addition to weed mitigation and proper septic maintenance, we are taking up the need for muck removal that impacts the use of our association water front. Much like

weed treatment, clearing our beach and boat areas include projects both short and long term. The lake quality improvement committee and the board is seeking a special appropriation of funds to move forward with a pilot project to dredge a 20-foot channel from the second beach boat launch to the lake. This vote will take place at the annual meeting. Important points to keep in mind:

- * This is an experiment to explore how well it works

- * Cost estimates including set up, dredging, disposal and a 10% contingency, will be no more than \$38,000. A lot of money, but an affordable start to determine long term interest in this process and saving our boat launch access.

- * We have the funds to support this project (See Financial commentaries for further details)

- * Pictures and updates will be documented so we can review the process and pilot success and keep you informed in the off season.

- * The service complies with regulations

- * The vendor is approved by DEEP and has a history of success in our area

- * Information is on our website.

If you have questions prior to the annual meeting, feel free to contact me or a member of the board for further discussion. We believe that this pilot project is a great start at planning ahead.

For those of you who are returning to your winter homes this week, a reminder to check in with our website often and be sure we have your email and correct address for off-season communication. You will be missed during this special week!

You can play an important role in stopping septic system pollution

Many of Connecticut's lakes, including Lake Hayward, are being hurt by leaky, undersized, code non-compliant systems, many of which were built in the 50's and 60's or even earlier.

How widespread is this problem? Most of Connecticut's lakes have more than a few failing systems, as well as systems overwhelmed by too many users and/or are used year-round rather than just seasonally. There still are archaic cesspools out there. These poor systems can contaminate swimming areas with *E. coli* and cause beach closures, as can excess *E. coli* from overcrowding, stormwater runoff, pets and diapered children attended by careless parents.

Another result can be contaminated drinking water wells by septic system bacteria and excess nitrogen (N) that seep into the ground water. In addition, excess N

and phosphorus (P) from incomplete septic processing or bad design or placement (high water table, excessively porous soils or low depth to bed rock) can enter the ground water and then make their way to the lake to feed algal blooms and plants including invasive weeds.

So please be a responsible lake steward: maintain your septic system, be careful of what is put into the system, and be waste water wise. Lastly, remember to never flush or put down your drain any cloggers or killers:

X Cloggers

- 'flushable' wipes

- diapers
- sanitary products
- dental floss
- paper towels
- coffee grounds
- grease & fats
- cooking oils
- cigarette butts
- cat litter

X Killers

- household chemicals & cleaners
- medications & beauty products
- paints, stains, & solvents
- gasoline & oil
- lawn care products
- antifreeze

Treasurer's year-end report for the 2013-2014 POALH budget year

The Association had an outstanding year from a fiscal standpoint. Revenues exceeded Expenses by \$44,085. The principal reasons are as follows:

- * Actual Association Revenues were \$15,057 more than budgeted as a result of:
 - * The receipt of a Grant from the Town of East Haddam for \$7,474 to assist the Association in its efforts to improve the quality of Lake Hayward.
 - * Collection of \$8,440 more in taxes, interest and lien fees than budgeted due the aggressive collection policies of attaching liens on delinquent properties where taxes are one year past due and the sale of several properties delinquent on their taxes
 - * Interest income decreased because of substantially lower interest rates on invested cash (\$857).
- * Actual Association Expenses were \$29,028 less than budgeted as a result of:

- * No Capital Expenditures (\$2,000) since all were included in Pavilion cost of construction
- * Events and Recreation (merged) into one caption were under Budget by \$7,742 because of the destruction of the Pavilion and its reconstruction.
- * Insurance costs increased because of the completion of the Pavilion (\$4,686).
- * Real Estate Taxes were less than budget by \$5,477. The Town's assessment of the Pavilion was less than expected.
- * Waste Management charges were less than budget by \$6,953
- * Lake Quality Improvement (the renamed "Weed Control") and the merged lake Water quality expenses were less than budget by \$5,538 because the Association was charged less for our spot treatment and we tested the quality of the Lake water using Association volunteers.

Highlights:

- **Collection of \$8,440 more in taxes, interest and lien fees than budgeted.**

- * The Promotional Account in the 2013-14 Budget was not used because of the change in accounting for Promotional Items resulting in \$2,906 favorable variance. The Promotional Account is set up as a revolving self funding reserve account starting in 2013-14.
- * All other Budget captions were under or over spent by \$1,000 or less (netting to a total of \$3,098 underspent

Report of the budget committee for the proposed 2015-16 budget

The Budget Committee submitted the attached 2015-16 Budget to the Board of Governors (See Page). They reviewed the Budget and recommended that it be submitted to the Association members for their approval. The Committees, officers and others responsible for individual budget line items have done a good job of documenting the cost of services and projects they are responsible for. Here are the highlights of the proposed 2015-16 Budget:

* The mil rate will probably remain the same as last year--0.04 mils. There are several factors that can influence the actual mil rate. They are: the decision of the membership on the funding of the Pilot Dredging Project; the rate of actual uncollectible taxes; and any substantial change in the Grand List value of Association members' properties.

* The 2015-16 Budget year tax revenues are projected to be \$161,500 which represents a projected 96% collection rate. Collections of delinquent taxes are forecasted to be \$2,000 and interest on delinquent taxes is forecasted to be \$1,575. The Board has instructed the Tax Collector to enforce the policy of charging interest on all tax payments not made within the 30 grace period.

* Stipends for paid positions were increased 5% to recognize the significant time and effort of the individuals who hold these positions. The Board agreed with the Budget Committee's recommendation to include a 5% additional increase in the 2016-17 and 2017-18 budgets subject to the membership's approval in those Budget year presentations.

* Insurance expenses are projected to increase approximately 5%.

* The Properties Committee has an aggressive list of services and projects they plan to deliver to the membership utilizing a combination of volunteers and paid service providers. The Committee understands the necessity of accomplishing a wide variety of projects on their 3 year maintenance plan using both volunteers and paid service providers.

* The Public Safety Committee Budget has been increased significantly (to \$15,000) as a result of many concerns voiced by members. These costs will include more police patrols at events and throughout Association properties not only in the summer months but also throughout the year. In addition, the parking sticker format will change so they are hanging tags.

* The Lake Quality Improvement Committee (the old "Weed Committee") has recommended a continuation of the spot treatment program with more aggressive treatment in areas that have significant weed growth. Included in this Budget is the cost of the Lake Water Testing program which is now being performed by volunteers.

* The Waste Management budget was increased to \$41,000 over the actual expense during 2013-14 to recognize that we have not had a rate increase in several years.

* Property taxes on the Pavilion and other Association properties are estimated to be \$3,500 based on the assessments received from the Town.

* The Events and Recreation Budgets have been merged into a single line

item. The Committee's net budget is a net expense of \$8,500. Many activities produce modest revenues to offset the cost of the events or service provided. The Committee's ability to conduct many events is directly related to its ability to secure volunteers to manage and run those events. A supplementary record of the revenues and expenses of each activity will be maintained by the Treasurer.

* The other expense categories have remained consistent or increased modestly.

The other portion of the 2015-16 Budget is the allocation of the Association's cash basis reserve accounts. Last year Association members approved the following Reserves: LQIC \$50,000; \$5,000 for a Promotional Items revolving Account; and an Operating Contingency Fund for 2014-15 of \$10,000. The Pavilion Construction project is complete so the remaining unexpended funds of \$6,862 are returned to the unallocated reserves. The Board also eliminated the Memorial Fund Reserve Account of \$525 and returned this amount to the Unallocated Reserves. The Treasurer will maintain a record of Memorial contributions but the Board will not require a separate reserve account because of its immateriality.

This year the Budget Committee and the Board are recommending the following: increasing the LQIC reserve by \$15,000 to \$65,000; setting up an operating contingency fund for the 2015-16 of \$15,000; establishing a capital maintenance reserve for 2015-16 of \$10,000 to fund several Properties Construction projects if there is not enough funds in the 2015-16 Operating Budget; and the continuation of the Promotional Items

Revolving Account Reserve of \$5,000. In summary, members are asked to approve the following reserve account allocation:

* Lake Quality Improvements: \$65,000

* Operating Budget Contingency for 2014-15: \$10,000

* Operating Budget Contingency for 2015-16: \$15,000

* Promotional Items Revolving Account: \$5,000

* Capital Maintenance Reserve for 2015-16: \$10,000

* Unallocated Reserves (Contingency) \$43,989

* Total Cash: \$148,989

In addition to approving the 2015-16 Operating Budget and the allocation of reserves as stated above, the Board is also presenting a special project for the dredging of the Second Beach Lagoon channel for a cost of \$38,000. The funds for this project can come from the 2013-14 Operating Budget excess of revenues over expenses (\$44,086). Last year the members approved a recommendation to use any excess of revenues over expenses starting in budget year 2013-14 to reduce taxes in 2015-16. However, the Board recommends that if the Association approves the Second Beach Pilot Dredging project the funds come from the 2013-14 excess of revenue over expenses, i.e., the Unallocated Reserve Account. The remaining balance of the 2013-14 excess (\$6,086) would be used to reduce revenue requirements in 2015-16.

This has been a very bad year for geese on the lake which is producing a lot of goose poop at the beaches. The beach rakers and the properties committee have been trying to keep up with the problem. We are working on a few ideas to try and keep the geese off of the beaches.

Next work party

On Oct. 25, there will be a work party to remove the rafts and swim lines from the water. Then on

Saturday November 1st will be a work party to remove any boats that are left on Association property. Both work parties will meet at the parking lot on first beach at 8:30am.

Other items to accomplish during the offseason and beyond are adding more space to some of the boat rakes.

- * Change the lighting at the tennis courts and parking lot to LED lighting.
- * Clean up some of the right of ways.
- * Repair the fence at first beach parking lot.
- * Put up a split rail fence at first beach near the

pavilion.

- * In the long term we also have many projects
- * Repair the stone wall at 1st beach.
- * Stain the fencing at 1st and 2nd beach parking lots.
- * Repairs to 2nd and 3rd beach parking lots.
- * Replace stairs at 3rd beach.
- * Do some work on the ball field.
- * Add some better sand to all of the beaches.

Starting next year we are planning to add docks at all of the beaches to accommodate some of the bigger boats such as sailboats and pontoon boats, this project will be done in stages 1 beach at a time.

Remember all boats must be removed from Association property by Oct. 31 or they will be removed and taken to the ball field. You will face a \$50.00 fine for all boats taken to the ball field.
