As I sit in Bradley International Airport writing this, I wait for my plane, delayed by severe storms along the coast (two hours so far). Several inches of rain are falling somewhere, but not here. Our rain deficit is almost 5 inches. Funny how nature works.

By now you're saying "What has this to do with Lake Hayward?" Well, it got me to thinking about the water level in the lake year to year. Some years, there's high water over the dam many days of the summer. Other years, it's hard to launch my boat. What will it be this year? Too soon to tell, but hopefully not a shallow year. But I do know this – nature runs in cycles, always striving for balance – yin and yang.

Hmmm, Bob, what's your point? Well, my point is that there is nothing we can do to make it rain or to stop the rain. Will the lake run high or low? A few members have suggested to me that the Board control the level by manipulating the dam. Water looks like it will be low, raise the dam; water too high, lower the dam. I say,



altering the water level is nature's work, not ours. This is not the kind of change we should embark upon.

OK, Bob, what kind of change are you talking about? As mentioned at our Town Hall, and again, at our June meeting, we can change how our use of the land affects the quality of the lake. Homeowners are using lawn services more frequently to achieve that beautiful suburban appearance without realizing that what works in a suburb will have adverse effects in a waterfront community. Now, don't get me wrong. I do not believe that anyone would intentionally go to the water, open a bag of chemicals and dump them in. I know you would not knowingly do that. But do you understand how what you put on your lawn filters through the soil into the water table? I did-

n't, but I am learning and it is changing my behavior.

To maintain the quality of Lake Hayward, we must become better stewards of the land. That means becoming better-informed consumers. Read the label of the product before you buy. Read the LQIC articles in the newsletters and the website. Attend educational sessions. Understand the mission of the Board and understand the critical importance of funding our mission to preserve our natural resource, Lake Hayward.

It's up to you and me to leave a clean legacy to the next generation and the one after that. If not for the children, think about your property values. Cleaner water, better fishing, better boating simply increases the value of your property.

We can do this if we change our behaviors. But change the water level? Hey, I'm only human. Now go and learn how to be a better steward of the land and teach your children well.

Public Safety Report: Have a safe Fourth of July celebration at the lake

Fireworks are meant to be enjoyed, but you'll enjoy them much more knowing that your family is safe. Please follow these safety tips from the National Council on Fireworks Safety and The National Fire Protection Association:



- The best way to protect your family is to attend public fireworks displays and leave the lighting to the professionals.
- If you plan to use fireworks, obey all local laws regarding their use.
- Think about your pet. Animals have sensitive ears and can be extremely frightened or stressed on the Fourth of July. Keep pets indoors to reduce the risk that they'll run loose or get injured.
- Little arms are too short to hold sparklers, which can heat up to 1,200 degrees. How about this? Let your young children use glow sticks instead. They can be just as fun, but

they don't burn at a temperature hot enough to melt glass.

- Children should NEVER light fireworks.
- Alcohol and fireworks do not mix. Save your alcohol for after the show.
- Wear safety glasses when shooting fireworks.
- Do not wear loose clothing while using fireworks.

- Light one firework at a time and then quickly move away.
- Never light fireworks indoors or near dry grass or other flammable substances.
- Point fireworks away from homes and vehicles.
- Never attempt to relight a "dud" firework. Wait 20 minutes and then soak it in a bucket of water.
- Always have a bucket of water and charged water hose nearby.
- Don't hold fireworks in your hand or have any part of your body over them while lighting.
- Dispose of spent fireworks by wetting them down, then placing them in a metal trash can away from any combustible materials.
- Never try to make your own fireworks.

Third Beach: Update on Glimmer Glen project

We know that the Glimmer Glen Project will be a report and discussion topic for months to come, but I will try to report only new updates to avoid being repetitive.

It is worth mentioning, however, that after Sunday's June Association meeting, I had the pleasure of meeting a member of the original project team that was involved in the development and building out of the road as it exists today. We now know that Glimmer Glen wasn't in the same state of development when the other association roads were adopted more than 20 years ago and this explains why it was "left off the list."

We also learned that it was the goal of the association at that time to build out the dirt road to comply with town specifications. Thanks to a state grant program available then, we were able to leverage special pricing to start the work but ultimately,

due to lack of funds, the project was never completed and ended after "Phase One" with the first layer of material laid. Many years later, road failing in spots and drainage issues to consider, today's Glimmer Glen Committee has started the process to scope the project and options for funding. As mentioned in the meeting, there will be a petition process with the town starting with the Board of Selectman.

We anticipate delays in light of the resignation of Mark Walter, the First Selectman, and potential need for a general election to find his replacement.

I guess the saying that "history repeats itself" isn't too far from the truth.

PAYMENT OF PROPERTY TAXES

All persons liable to pay real estate taxes to the Property Owners' Association of Lake Hayward as levied on the October 1, 2015 Grand List are hereby notified that the taxes are due and payable on July 1, 2016 at the mill rate of 3.50. The taxes will become delinquent on August 1, 2016 if not paid by this date. Delinquent tax bills shall be subject to interest of one and one-half percent per month reverting to the due date, July 1, 2016. The minimum interest charge is \$2.00. All persons in the Tax District who do not receive a tax bill should call the Tax Collector at 860-295-8769 to obtain their bill before the end of the grace period, August 1, 2016. Failure to receive a property tax bill does not invalidate the payment of the tax or related delinquent interest charge if not paid by August 1, 2016. Help is on the way to protect Lake Hayward watershed with land purchase

There is a 115-acre parcel for sale, most of which is in our watershed. The Colchester Land Trust has stepped up to purchase the land to keep it from being developed into a housing subdivision with all the clear cutting that goes along with that.

The parcel was scheduled to be developed in two phases, one with 12 lots and one with 30 lots, and it is the 30-lot portion that is in the Lake Hayward watershed. The 30-lot section is land and marsh that winds its way directly into Lake Hayward from a distance less than a mile from the north end of the lake.

Land trust president Andy George will make a presentation to Lake Hayward residents at the **July 30 Town Hall** to fully outline the project and offer suggestions on how Lake Hayward residents can provide support.

What: Land Trust hike

When: 9:45 a.m., July 31.

Where: Meet at First Beach Pavilion.

On Sunday morning, July 31, the Colchester Land Trust will offer an 1-1/2 hour walk on the property to residents of the Lake Hayward community. While there are some existing trails, a portion of the walk will be just "in the woods." The total property has some elevation gains, but the walk will focus on the area that drains into Lake Hayward, which is less hilly. Those walking

should dress appropriately, bring water and bug spray. Dogs are permitted, but not encouraged. Plans are to meet at the First Beach parking lot at 9:45 a.m. on July 31 and then carpool to the location on Bulkeley Hill Road (five-minute ride).

We are indebted to the Colchester Land Trust for their efforts to bring this project to fruition. Remember that Lake Hayward is like the bottom of a bowl, everything that happens within our 1,500 acre watershed ends up impacting the lake. It is important that we partner with such efforts to maintain our watershed in its natural state.

Please note the 10 a.m. start for the July 30 Town Hall and the 9:45 a.m. July 31 walk on the property.

Monday garbage pickup continues until Sept. 6

All-Waste Control will collect trash and recyclables twice a week (Monday and Friday) during the summer and the twice-weekly pickup started on June 13.



The last Monday pickup will be Sept. 6, after which pickup will be on Fridays only. The Town of East Haddam has implemented "single stream recycling" so it is no longer necessary to separate the various recyclables into separate containers and/or put them out on separate days. All recyclables can be combined and placed into a single container and put out with your regular trash. We must recycle: 1. Glass and metal food and beverage containers (rinsed); lids go in trash (No broken

glass, mugs, windowpanes, ceramics, light bulbs, mirrors, dishes or tempered glass) 2. Plastic containers #1 through #7 (rinsed); lids go in trash 3. Newspaper, magazines, cereal/pasta boxes, milk and juice cartons, junk mail (No phone books, wax- or plastic-coated cardboard, soiled newspaper or magazines, books, plastic (Tyvek) envelopes) 4. Cardboard (broken down) (No wax coated boxes, soiled boxes, pizza boxes) 5. Garbage bags should not be left uncovered for more than one day to prevent animals getting into them.


